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FROM MY TRAVELS

After a business trip to Buenos

Aires earlier this year, Charles and I hopped over to the Uruguayan beach town of José Ignacio. It wasn't the height of summer, but I love being by the sea in any season, and it was a blissfully quiet time to experience the charm of the place. We stayed at Bahia Vik (vikretreats.com; doubles from \$850), a collection of sleek bungalows right on the sand owned by Alex and Carrie Vik, who have three properties in the area. (Estancia Vik, a traditional ranch a few minutes inland, was closed for the season when we were there, but we checked it out, and it's spectacular, perfect for those who enjoy a pastoral atmosphere and don't mind having to drive to the beach.) The Vik properties all have good, locally sourced food and a service style that is casual yet thoughtful, but what really sets them apart is the dramatic contemporary art that fills the public spaces and guest rooms. While in José Ignacio, don't miss La Huella (paradorlahuella.com; entrées \$17-\$24) for fresh seafood on the beach, and be sure to take a drive up-country to chef Francis Mallmann's Garzon (restaurantegarzon. com: entrées \$47-\$71). a showcase for his celebrated wood-fired cooking.
